1. 1. Timely Reporting Survey (Survey on Estimation of Area and Yield Statistics of crops)

Area enumeration on wet 1 and (1st visit) has been completed: The 2nd visit has also been completed in all Districts except Cannanore. Crop Cutting Surveys on paddy (Autumn 1982) was completed and that of winter paddy is in progress. Crop cutting surveys on other perennial and an nual crops are also in progress.

Area and production estimates of Agricultural crops during 1980-81 have been finalised. Area and production of Major crops for the state for the year 1980-81 are furnished below. Estimates of area under Autumn Paddy 1982 and production of rice are being prepared. Tabulation of data collected through the dry land survey 1981-82 has been started.

2. Wholesale price index numbers

Wholesale prices of the various commodities from selected centres are at present collected under the Market Intelligence Scheme. The main object of the collection of this data is to provide for the benefit of the primary producers, a regular and prompt supply of the daily wholesale rates of important agricultural commodities and their trend. Moreover this regular collection of prices and other related data enables Government to keep a close watch over the changing price situation and take on the spot decisions.

Weekly wholesale prices of 17 agricultural commodities are being regularly collected from 37 centres for computing wholesale price index numbers. These index numbers are being regularly furnished to the Government of India.

The Index Numbers of agricultural commodities for the quarter ending December 1982 are given below:—

3 Index Numbers of parity between prices received and paid by farmers

The index numbers of parity indicate the level of the prosperity of the farmers. Prices received do not by themselves give an idea of the prosperity of the farmers unless these are studies in relation to the prices paid by them on items entering domestic and farm expenditure. Changes in the relative levels of prices received and prices paid by the farmers in relation to the base period can be measured by the index of parity between these two. For the computation of parity index numbers this division continued to collect parity index prices of 14 items from 20 centres and computed monthly parity index between prices received and paid by farmers and forwarded to the Government of India during this quarter also. The following table gives the parity index numbers for the quarter ending December 1982.

4. STATE INCOME

The unit completed the work relating to the revision of estimates of Net State Domestic product for the period from 1970-71 to 1980-81. Essimates of District Income for the period were also prepared and furnished to the State Planning Board for the Economic Review.

Provisional Estimate of the Net State Domestic product for 1980-81 has shown an increase from Rs. 1198 crores in 1970-71 to Rs. 3314 crores. At 1970-71 prices the estimate for 1980-81 was Rs. 1490 crores.

Estimates of per capita income for 1980-81 and 1970-71 were Rs. 1312 and 567 respectively. Per capita income for 1980-81 at 1970-71 prices was Rs. 590 showing a growth of about 4 per cent.

The following table gives the structure and change in composition of Net State Domestic product of Kerala according to its industry of origin from 1970-71 to 1980-81 at current and 1970-71 prices.

5. POPULATION STATISTICS

5.1. Vital Statistics

(1) Civil Registration.—The tabulated data for urban centres for 1978 has been received. Coding of cards for urban centres for 1981 is in progress. The monthly return of advance summary figures on birth and deaths upto September 1982 have been furnished to the Registrar General of India. Birth and death rates according to civil registration infant mortality still birth maternal mortality, are given below:—

(2) Model Registration—Survey on cause of death in rural areas:—The monthly and half yearly reports received from the Primary Health Centres were forwarded to the Registrar General of India. Training to Medical and para—medical staff was given to conduct the baseline survey as on 1-1-1983 in the 13 newly selected Primary Health Centres and 9 retained Primary Health Centres during the month of December 1982.

5.2. Sample Registration

Fifty per cent sample units (75 units) were replaced with effect from 1-1-1982. During the quarter under report preliminary work for the replacement of the remaining 50% sample units were undertaken as directed by the Registrar General of India.

34th Half yearly survey was completed by utilising the services of experienced Investigatros, besides usual computor. The work of reverification of the results was got completed by utilising the services of the other offices in the districts, besides Additional District Officers (SR). Results in respect of all the 150 samples were sent to the Registrar General.

Annual reports on sample registration for 1979 was finalised and sent to the press. Important findings are as follows:—

6. SOCIAL STATISTICS

6.1. Manpower

The report on employment prospects for non-technical, less qualified manpower in Kerala has been published and a brief note on "The manpower situation in Kerala" during the sixth plan period has been prepared and submitted to Government, besides". "The sample study on large, medium and small scale engineering industries in Kerala" has been completed.

A brief note on the manpower situation in Kerala during the sixth plan period is given below:—

Manpower situation in Kerala during the sixth plan period.—The previous Five Year Plans left a sizable backlog of unemployment in the state as employment generation was not commensurate with the addition to labour force. The NSS 1977-78, estimated that Kerala contained 11-09% of the total unemployed in the country and the rate of unemployment as 21-05% the maximum here. According to 'Employment and Housing Survey-1980' labour force in Kerala came to 77-91 lakhs of which 34.4 lakhs were fully employed, 29.5 lakhs, partially employed and 14 lakhs were unemployed. Educated unemployment is the major menace of this state. In 1981 educated unemployed came to 9.23 lakhs constituting 48.5% of the total unemployed. Medical graduates, (651) Engineering graduates (1217) Engineering diploma holders (7866) etc. who were registered with the Employment Exchanges shows the actue unemployment situation among technically qualified persons in the state.

During the period 1970-71 public sector employment increased 71% (ie. from 2.93 lakhs to 5.01 lakhs) and privates ector employment increased 30%. (ie. from 4.10 lakhs to 5.33 lakhs). Employment prospects for technical and professional manpower during the sixth plan is quite discouraging. For instance, the availability of agricultural technical personal during the 6th plan period is estimated as 766 where as their estimated requirement is only 681. Similarly availability of medical graduates comes to 3011 and their requirement is 123). Availability of dentists is 140 and requirement is only 21. As regards nurses availability is 2775 and requirement is 1225. 5705 Engineering graduates will be available when 1836 of them are required. 10716 Engineering diploma holders will be available to meet the estimated requirement of 2714. But availability of veterinary personnel during the sixth plan period is 319 only to meet the estimated requirement of 402.

Employment prospects for non-technical less qualified manpower in Kerala.—
The study on employment prospects for non-technical less qualified manpower in Kerala, was conducted by Sri P.C Jain, Research Officer of Manpower Division, with the main objective of examining the extent of unemployment among matriculates, intermediates and Traduates in Arts subjects and also to ascertain possibilities of employment for them.

It was found that non-technical less qualified manpower formed 96% of the educated unemployed in the state. Their supply increase 16 times over the last 25 years where as their demand did not cope with to extend them employment. Their employment participation in the private sector came to only 40% and in the private sector their participation was 55%. The declining trend of employment in public and private sectors necssitate them to seek self employment. But self employment schemes implemented in the state did not give an encouraging picture But self employment programmes, viable and appropriate for this less qualified group should be found out and implemented to lessen the problem of unemployment among them. Employment prospects for them is committed to supporting services to small Industrial enterprises and creation of industrial infrastructure scale in the rural belts. Transport and trade sectors are the right areas for this less qualified group to seek self employment.

(I) Survey on Estimation of Area and yield statistics of crops (T.R.S.):—Wet land survey for autumn and winter seasons are completed in 19 villages in the District: Dry land survey has been completed in about 25% of the area. Crop cutting survey, on paddy was completed for autumn season and that for winter season has been started. Crop cutting survey on all the other crops have also been started.

The analysis of the pre-harvest schedules of winter paddy has shown that the area of winter paddy during the year increased by about 1% compared to the previous year. The yield rate has also shown increase compared to last winter.

- (2) Agricultural Census:—The field work of the quinquennial agricultural census was completed in all the samples of the District. The field work of the input survey in the rural samples was completed. Tabulation of the data collected in the main census has been started. The distribution of holding, according to size group has shown that a large percentage of the holdings are in the size group of below 5 cents. Only very few holdings are in the size group of 10 acres and above.
- (3) Cost of cultivation of important crops:—The third round of the survey to estimate the cost of important crops like paddy, tapioca, coconut and arecanut is being conducted in Neyyattinkara and Nedumangad Taluks.

2. Prices and related items-Mark it Intelligence Scheme

The collection and reporting of prices in the selected centres continued during the quarter also.

3. Population Statistics

The 34th half yearly survey in the 15 samples in the District was completed by November 1982.

(2) Evaluation study of National Rural Employment Programme:—The study was conducted in Parasala Block of Trivandrum District. In the first stage of the study a sample of 50 workers were selected for detailed enumeration. The work of the first stage was completed by October 1982. In the second stage a sample of works undertaken in the scheme was selected for detailed study. The field work relating to the second stage was also completed by December 1982.

APPENDIX I

II. I. Wholesale Price Index Numbers

During recent years index numbers assumed considerable importance for Planning and policy making. The wholesale price index of agricultural commodities as a whole in the state showed the real trends in wholesale price ever time. The wholesale price is to be taken as the rate at which a relatively large transaction of purchase for further sale is effected. The wholesale price should neither be the maximum or minimum nor average price of a commodity on a particular day, but should relate to the mode price, the price at which most of the transactions take place during the peak marketing period of a day.

The index numbers relate to the wholesale price of important agricultural commodities produced and transacted in the state with the agricultural year 1952-53 as the base. These indices are computed every month. Prices for the computation of index are collected from different centre spread over the state. The centres are selected taking into consideration the relative importance of the area with regard to production and marketing of agricultural commodities.

In the calculation of the index, 17 agricultural commodities are included. These commodities are grouped into two main classes viz.

- (1) Food crops and (2) Non-food crops. Food crops are further divided into four.
- (i) Food grains (ii) Sugar (molasses) (iii) Condiments and Spices and (iv) Fruits and vegetables. Non-food crops are sub-divided into (i) Oil-Seeds and (ii) Plantation crops. A complete list of the commodities included in the computation of the wholesale price index is given below.

Food Crops

- 1. Food Grains .- Rice
- 2. Sugar.-Molasses
- 3. Condiments and Spices.—(1) Pepper (2) Ginger (3) Turmeric (4) Arecanut (5) Cardamom
- 4. Fruits and Vegetables.—(1) Banana (2) Tapioca (3) Cashewnut
 Non-Food Crops
- 1. Oil Seeds.—(1) Coconut (2) Groundnut (3) Seasmum
- 2. Plantation Crops. (1) Tea (2) Coffee (3) Rubber

The simple arithmatic mean of the week and wholesale prices is taken as the average monthly price of each commodity.

The three components necessary for the computation of wholesale price index are (1) Weighting diagram (2) Base prices and (3) Current price.

In order to make the index fully representative weights are assigned to the commodities in proportion to the value of their production and import. The imperta of all the commodities except rice, sugar and cashewauts are negligible. Hence weights are assigned for these commodities in proportion to the value of production. For rice and molasses weights are assigned in proportion to the value of consumption estimated by sample surveys of this Department.

This method is adopted since the total value of imports of these commodities are not available. For calculating the weight for cashewnuts, the value of production and import are taken into account.

The agricultural year 1952-53 is taken as the base year so as to keep in confermity with the base period used for the construction of other indices of agricultural commodities.

SMT 37/229/83-(4)

Wholesale prices of the various commodities from selected centres are at present collected under the Market Intelligence Scheme. This scheme for the improvement of Market Intelligence was implemented in the Second Five Year Plan and continued in the Third Five Year Plan for obtaining the necessary Market intelligence from all over the state. The scheme was administered by the Agriculture Department till April 1966. Since then the work under this Scheme was taken over by this Directorate.

The important function involved in the implementation of the Market Intelligence Scheme are:—(1) Collection and reporting of accurate and reliable data (2) Rapid processing, analysing and presenting the data in a systematic manner (3) Dissemination of the Market Intelligence information promptly and estematically.

Method of Computation

The price quotations of various commodities received from the selected markets are converted into price relatives by expressing the current price as a percentage of base year price. The commodity index is calculated as the simple average of these price relatives at the various centres. Weighted average of these commodity indices is the sub-group index. The weighted average of the sub-group indices is the group index and the weighted average of the group indices is the index of wholesale prices.

The table below shows the average annual wholesale price 4ndex numbers of Agricultural commodities in the state for the years from 1974 to 1982.

The wholesale price index numbers for agricultural commodities in the state, which has been continously rising from 1976, touched a new peack during 1980. The sub-group index for food crops has been increasing year by year. Almost all the major groups and sub groups in the wholesale price index have been increasing during the past eight years.

APPENDIX II

11.2 Economic Census 1977

The processing of 1977 Economic census data has been completed and the final tabulated results received from the Computer Center, New Delhi. This census which was conducted in Kerala as part of a nation wide operation, was a census of non-agricultural establishments employing at least one hired worker on a fairly regular basis. Using the data collected in the census a number of tables giving the description of activity, No, of persons usually working, type of ownership etc. were produced. The distribution of establishments by activity with their principal characteristics is given in the Annexure.

Though not envisaged in the scheme of economic census information on own-account enterprises, is, enterprises run wholly by household numbers without employment of hired workers was also collected in Kerala. As per the census, including an account enterprises, there were nearly 6.91 lakh enterprises in the State. These provided employment to nearly 29.46 lakh persons. The survey on Housing and Employment conducted by the Directorate of Economics and Statistics in 1980 shows total No.6f employed persons as 63.7 lakhs. It may be inferred from this that roughly about 1/3 of the employment in the State is provided by the non-agricultural sector.

When establishments in the non-agricultural sector alone were counted the total number comes to 1.71 lakhs. Employment to 14.07 lakh persons were provided in these establishments. Out of this, 12.81 lakhs wer: hired workers and the remaining 1.26 lakhs household members. 16.04% of the establishments were owned and operated by the Government and 8.95% were household units.
